## Programs @ Lanier



At the next Live@Lanier, Olin Sansbury, Chancellor Emeritus of USC Spartanburg and author of "Joint Ventures", will share his perspectives on the roots, psychology, and process of partisan politics. Olin says, "Even George Washington could not avoid partisan politics. He regretted the conflicts between two of his loyal Cabinet members but he understood the reality that democracy requires partisanship. More recently, however, some politicians and interest groups give partisanship a bad name, demonizing opposition to advance their own interest."

roles of population growth, mass media, the 2-party system, voting by personality versus philosophy, and more.
