


Bidding You Adieu

This will be my last note to you as your President. My second term on the board of directors is up at the end of March.

It truly has been an honor and a privilege to have served as your President for the past few years. I love everything about this little library- from the warm and welcoming

staff to all the board members who bring a wealth of talents to the table and to all the members who make our library a vibrant community. I have especially enjoyed the opportunity to work closely with our very effective ED, Jenny Purtill.

It has been a true pleasure to see the physical improvements our board has been able to implement over the past five years which make our charming and historic building even more comfortable, safe and inviting. The list of deferred maintenance that has been addressed is pretty impressive. We fixed the nagging water and moisture issue in the downstairs crypt, replaced furnaces dating from 1979, installed solar panels, reinforced the parking lot's retaining wall (thereby averting a disastrous collapse), had the exterior of the building repainted, replaced worn out carpeting both upstairs and downstairs, remodeled the upstairs bathroom to make it ADA compliant, replaced broken blinds in several rooms, installed UV film on East facing windows and replaced the compromised glass in the large Palladian window, and removed a couple of dangerous trees.

Thanks to the skills of two of our members, we now have a gorgeous custom podium and a replacement "Bob"- our signature giraffe. These improvements have all been made possible thanks to the support from several foundations, generous bequests from Legacy Donors, and to the contributions from our membership. In short, the Lanier Library is in good shape and is getting better all the time. The future looks bright... "so bright, I gotta wear shades!"

Our current Vice President, Cindy Caldwell, will serve as your next President and she will be great! So I will not say "Until next time" but close with my daily Wordle starting entry. That is -

Membership Renewal Time


Is your membership about to expire? No need to come in to the library, just visit the library website by clicking on:
